The TWSA exhibition at the Kenosha Public Museum will be coming up starting May 7th and running through August 7th. Watch for this exhibition of really wonderful watercolor work.

Artist Profile

Quick Sketch - Chris Sommerfelt

Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, February 2, 2016 – She was born in St. Paul and grew up in Saukville. Chris Sommerfelt always knew she wanted to be an artist. Her father had a liking for art, so much so that he went to art school after serving in WWII. I wondered out loud while speaking with Chris if she got her love for art through her father. She said she was always encouraged to make art. Her father had a job as a layout artist doing newspaper ads and used to bring home reams of white paper for Chris to draw on.

She said her grade school teacher was the one person who most encouraged her to keep making art. This was a small classroom where 2 grades were combined into one classroom. She continued to take all of the art classes that were offered from junior high through all of her elective classes at Port Washington High School.

After high school Chris began taking art classes in the fall of 1970 in a 2-year program at MATC. The educational program at MATC was, then as it is now, a schedule of classes that prepared their graduates for a professional career in the program of their particular enrollment. Chris would be pursuing a career in graphic design so she took classes in photography, printing, setting type, graphic design, drawing, illustration, air brush photo retouching, etc.

Chris said that at the time she attended MATC they didn't have an internship program as schools do now. There was a competition of sorts sponsored by various businesses that offered what we would now call an internship in their place of business for the summer. Chris won the competition in her area of design at the Styles Campbell Studio. After her 'internship' she stayed on for 2 years after graduation as a Production Artist for the studio.

She found, after this time, that she wanted to stretch her creative pursuits so she found employment at M & I Bank as one of 3 staff artists engaging herself in production art, design, and some illustration. It was

during this time, 1976, that she met and married her husband Rick. So after 5 years at M & I she left to start her family, run her home and raise her 2 daughters Laura and Karin.

Time passed into the early 80's and Chris was missing her art so she investigated the adult evening classes program at Wauwatosa West and enrolled in some watercolor classes there. She really liked being back making art and even started attending a few art fairs each year. In the late 80's Chris decided that she wanted to get back into the world of design. Her daughters were older now to make this possible.

She found a part time job at Birdsall Voss Advertising. This was about the time that digital technology came into our lives. The agency invested in computers and Chris says, "This is where I learned how to work on a computer." She remained at the agency for 5 years and decided that she would like to work on her own as a graphic designer. She did that successfully until 2008 when an opportunity arose for her to become the designer for the Brookfield Academy, a private K4 thru 12 schools. In this capacity Chris creates all of their external marketing material and all of their internal design needs as well.

She has taken classes with Bridget Austin, Win Jones, Joy Moon, Tom Francesconi, Sharon Crosbie, Ann Miotke and Alice Struck. All of these artists have influenced Chris's approach to creating her own work.

Chris likes to keep busy so in addition to being the Exhibition Chairperson for the Wisconsin Watercolor Society she teaches watercolor at the Art Park Senior Center in Wauwatosa, The Wauwatosa Recreation Department, Mentor for the Wauwatosa Artists Workshop, (WAW), and teaches watercolor workshops at The Clearing in Door County. She is also a member of the League of Milwaukee Artists, she conducts critiques, demos and judges exhibits for local art groups, tutors privately, and she is involved with a group called Fine Art Montage, artists working together for exhibition opportunities.

In Memoriam



Mary Lee Benson May 6, 1940 – June 9, 2015

Mary Lee Benson passed away peacefully on June 9 from breast cancer. She lived in Davenport, IA from 1941until 1980. She graduated from Augustana College, Rock Island, IL in 1962.

Mary Lee and Donald H. Benson were

married in 1963 and resided in Davenport, IA until 1980 when they moved to Cedarburg, WI. After retirement in 2002, they lived on Washington Island, WI where they had a summer home for many years.

Mary Lee served as the Art Director of the Washington Island Art and nature center and was a member of the Washington Island Zoning and planning committee for over 10 years, serving as secretary and chairman. She was a talented artist in Norwegian rosemaling and then in watercolor, acrylic and printmaking. Her artistic style was continually evolving as she believed strongly in creating and finding new direction with each painting.

She loved being surrounded by nature at her home, gardening and caring for the land. It was important to her that the environment be protected for future generations. She also loved to travel and was thankful for the many hiking trips she and Don took.

Peter Boyajian passed away July 1, 2015 at the age of 87. He attended the Layton School of Art and graduated from the UWM. Peter worked as an Art Teacher at Pulaski High School in Milwaukee for 34 years, the Milwaukee

Art Center and Alverno College. Peter owned an art gallery on 27th Street for 7 years where he sold original art, the work of local artist's, frames and gave lessons. He was a very prolific artist, a member of the Wisconsin Watercolor Society and the Milwaukee Men's Sketch Club. After moving from Greendale in 1998 he lived at The Villages in Florida where he continued to paint actively in his studio. He is survived by his wife of 30 years, Judy, three sons and two step children.

Richard H. Smith

March 2, 1932 - December 11, 2015

Richard Smith grew up in Youngstown Ohio before moving to Milwaukee in 1955 after graduating from Miami University. There he received his Bachelor of Architecture degree. Richard served his country in Korea and after the war did architectural work there to rebuild the country.

In Milwaukee Richard worked for Steffen & Kemp designing churches, Miller & Waltz and then KM Development as Project Manager. After retirement in the 1980's he took up painting full time. Richard explored pen and ink and with his wonderful drafting skills would work directly on paper without sketching first. He also tried oils, pastels, acrylics and then moved into watercolors. He painted plein air, and traveled several times to France where he painted with Tony Van Hasselt and Judy Wagner. Richard also traveled to Mexico painting with Tony. There were also trips to Maine and Amelia Island where he painted with Tony and Judy. Wisconsin was also a favorite choice for painting where he did several river trips.

Richard preferred painting landscapes, buildings and boats and he received many awards throughout his years of painting. He was a member of the Wisconsin Watercolor Society, League of Milwaukee Artist's, displayed his work in art fairs in the 90's and opened up his home studio in Mequon during the Cedarburg Artist's Guild Studio Tours.

Richard's painting career was shared with his wife of many years, Leila. They were a team, helping each other by offering criticism; helping in composition and color; and interpretation. They both settled on watercolor as their medium however the similarities stop there. Richard preferred to work loose and fast while Leila works slower and is more meticulous. Both partners were very energetic and enthusiastic about their work because it was such a significant part of their lives and marriage. Leila continues teaching watercolor painting classes in her home studio in Mequon.
