Racine artist, Lisa Englander was one of two featured artists in an exhibition at the Center for the Visual Arts, Wausau, WI. The exhibition title, '*Ak-Sez*, refers to the axes of symmetry, biology and geometric forms present in both artists' individual iconographies. Englander is a nationally known artist, with works in corporate and museum collections across the country, including the Racine Art Museum (RAM). She is known for her work at RAM, where she curates impeccable artist-designed wares for the RAM Museum Store and organizes the Museum's popular marshmallow PEEPSinspired art composition. Englanders work is also included in the exhibition, Watercolor USA 2021 at the Springfield Art Museum, Springfield, MO through August 29, 2021.

The Woodwalk Gallery in Egg Harbor, WI represents the work of Sheboygan artist **Evie Grasse**. Her watercolor Painting, "Pink and White Peonies" is on view there.

Plymouth artist **Keary Kautzer** received a Merit Award for "Springtime", a painting he submitted into the 26th Annual Alive in the Arts Juried Show. The show is on view through August 6, 2021 at Gallery 110 North, Plymouth Arts Center, Plymouth. Kautzer also had a painting, "Ephraim Regatta", in the Hardy Gallery's 59^a Annual Juried exhibition in Ephraim, WI.

Bayside artist, **Judy Gahn Murphy** received the Grohmann Award for "Hecho en Mexico" and **Kathryn Wedge** earned a third place award for "The Number 14" at the MSOE Grohmann Museum, Milwaukee, WI.

Wausau artist, **Diane Shabino** was accepted into the Rocky Mountain National Watermedia Exhibit. Her painting "Thicket" received an Honorable Mention. Shabino's painting, "Sweet Autumn Clematis" received the Charles Strissel Memorial Award in the Illinois Watercolor Society National Exhibit. She also had paintings included in the 27^a Annual Red River Watercolor Society, "Rouge Claret" and in 2020 Midwest Seasons, "Adolescent Acorns 1".

Lynne Railback has several of her paintings accepted into shows – Five of her paintings were accepted for inclusion in *Skyway 2021: A Contemporary Collaboration* exhibition. They were accepted as they represent Florida's native plants. The exhibition spans four Florida museums opening May 21 through August, 2021. Two watercolors were accepted in ASBA's *Wildly Exquisite, Florida's Native plants Traveling Show*, opening January 2021. Railsback's painting *Glade Mallow* was selected for the ASBA Banner Year. Railsback received an Award of Excellence in the *Watercolor Now* exhibit at Margaret Harwell Art Museum in Council Bluffs, MO. "Soybean" *Glycine max* will be on exhibit in ASBA'S "Abundant Future" Exhibition in the New York Botanic Garden fall of 2021.

Stephen Quiller, Crestones, Late March

Stephen Quiller

In the winter Stephen Quiller cross country skies with his sketching materials most late afternoons.

Stephen Quiller lives in southern Colorado in the San Juan Mountains, an old range with high valleys and rounded, wizened mountain forms. Fifty miles to the east, across the San Luis Valley, is a newer range, the Sangre de Cristo, whose jagged forms provide a backdrop to the great Sand Dunes National Monument. One gray squally March day Quiller set up his palette within sight of this incredible view of the Crestone Needles and Kit Carson Peak.

He was attracted to the Chamisa and dark Pinon in the foreground, which perfectly framed the rich red mountain and the magnificent receding peaks above. The inclement weather not only provided a neutral gray tone that set off the color of the mountains, it also added the challenge of wind and misty droplets that left their mark in the sky wash. He likes when the elements actually make their way into the painting and lets the viewer know the piece was done plein air.

Stephen Quiller is an internationally recognized artist and teacher. He lives in Crede, Colorado. Quiller is currently featured in the June/July issue of Plein Air Magazine.
